Key Verbs Used in Telling Time

The verb *ser* (to be) is commonly used when telling time in Spanish. It is typically conjugated in the third person singular form *es* for one o'clock and in the third person plural form *son* for other hours. For example:

- Es la una. (It is one o'clock.)
- Son las dos. (It is two o'clock.)
