PROM IN PHYSICAL THERAPY PLAYS A CRITICAL ROLE IN THE REHABILITATION AND RECOVERY OF PATIENTS WITH VARIOUS MUSCULOSKELETAL AND NEUROLOGICAL IMPAIRMENTS. BY FACILITATING JOINT MOVEMENT, PROM PREVENTS THE ADVERSE EFFECTS OF IMMOBILITY, SUCH AS STIFFNESS, MUSCLE SHORTENING, AND JOINT CONTRACTURES.

DEFINITION AND SCOPE

PROM INVOLVES THE THERAPIST MOVING THE PATIENT'S LIMB OR JOINT WITHOUT ANY EFFORT FROM THE PATIENT'S MUSCLES. ROLE IN REHABILITATION

IN REHABILITATION, PROM SERVES AS AN INITIAL STEP BEFORE PROGRESSING TO ACTIVE EXERCISES. IT HELPS PREPARE JOINTS AND MUSCLES FOR MORE DYNAMIC MOVEMENTS ONCE THE PATIENT GAINS SUFFICIENT STRENGTH AND CONTROL. PROM ALSO AIDS IN EVALUATING JOINT INTEGRITY, DETECTING MOVEMENT LIMITATIONS, AND REDUCING PAIN THROUGH GENTLE MOBILIZATION.

THERAPEUTIC GOALS OF PROM

PREVENTING CONTRACTURES

CONTRACTURES REFER TO THE PERMANENT SHORTENING OF MUSCLES, TENDONS, OR LIGAMENTS THAT RESTRICT JOINT MOVEMENT. PROM HELPS REDUCE THE RISK OF CONTRACTURE FORMATION BY GENTLY STRETCHING TISSUES AND MAINTAINING JOINT MOBILITY.

ENHANCING CIRCULATION

PASSIVE MOVEMENT STIMULATES BLOOD FLOW AND LYMPHATIC DRAINAGE, WHICH ARE CRUCIAL FOR TISSUE HEALTH AND HEALING. IMPROVED CIRCULATION ALSO AIDS IN REDUCING EDEMA AND PREVENTING COMPLICATIONS SUCH AS DEEP VEIN THROMBOSIS.

5. PERFORM THE MOVEMENT SLOWLY, AVOIDING EXCESSIVE FORCE OR RAPID MOTIONS.
6. REPEAT THE MOVEMENT FOR THE PRESCRIBED NUMBER OF REPETITIONS OR DURATION.
7. MONITOR THE PATIENT'S RESPONSE THROUGHOUT THE SESSION FOR ANY SIGNS OF DISCOMFORT OR ADVERSE REACTIONS.

USE OF ASSISTIVE DEVICES

IN SOME CASES, ASSISTIVE DEVICES SUCH AS CONTINUOUS PASSIVE MOTION (CPM) MACHINES MAY BE EMPLOYED TO DELIVER PROM. THESE DEVICES PROVIDE CONTROLLED, REPETITIVE JOINT MOVEMENT, ESPECIALLY USEFUL AFTER SURGERIES LIKE KNEE ARTHROPLASTY.
